Michigan Training Institute 2006

Your Opportunity for Comprehensive Disaster Training!

The Complete Application Form / Course List packet is available at www.greaterkzooredcross.org

The American Red Cross invites you to attend the Michigan Training Institute (MTI) to be held June 6-11, 2006. This training concentrates on Disaster Services, Armed Forces Emergency Services and International Social Services, focusing on classes that are not normally available at local chapters. Several of these classes are required for advancement in the Disaster Services Human Resources (DSHR) Program. **MTI registration format has changed. Please read carefully. The tuition (daily fee) is FREE for Michigan residents who register by May 5! (Lodging costs are separate from the tuition/daily fee.)**

LOCATION

Classes will be held on the campus of Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan.

REGISTRATION DEADLINE

Registration must be received by the date indicated:

- May 5, 2006 ➡ All Intermediate and Advanced
Courses requiring Form 5898H.
May 5, 2006 ➡ Last day for basic course registrations.

Students must register through their home/custodial chapter. Chapters are responsible for collecting ALL fees. Chapters will be billed after MTI for charges incurred. **Form(s) 5898H** (when required) must accompany registration form.

ACCEPTANCE AND CONFIRMATION

Upon receipt of your application from your home chapter, it will be checked for conflicts, fee computation accuracy, and endorsement. **Incomplete applications will be returned to the chapter.**

All completed registrations are handled on a first arrived, first processed basis. Class minimums and maximums will be strictly followed. Courses requiring ARC Form 5898H need a **separate Form 5898H for each course that requires one**. Each Form 5898H must be endorsed by your home chapter. Requests for courses requiring a 5898H will not be accepted after May 5, 2006.

Confirmation of participation, course choice(s), and map to the facility will be sent directly to participants one-to-two weeks prior to the institute.

DAILY FEE WAIVER!

Thanks to the sale of **"Proud to be American"** automobile license plates in the State of Michigan, a financial grant was approved to cover the daily fee for Michigan Training Institute participants. The following guidelines apply:

- **Must be a Michigan resident** to qualify.
- Must be **actively involved** with the Red Cross in Michigan **and** request to attend MTI **approved and signed by the Chapter Emergency Services Director or Executive Director**.
- Daily Fee will be waived if received by May 5, 2006.

LODGING AND MEALS

CAMPUS LODGING DORMITORY STYLE

There are two rooms to a suite with a shared bath. The suites are \$38.00 per night for one person, or \$21.00 per person when two people share a suite (one person in each room, sharing the bath). There is a \$6.00 fee for

linens and towels for each person staying in the dormitory. Smoking is not permitted in the rooms. We suggest you bring your own pillow, an alarm clock, and a fan. (The rooms are not air-conditioned. The weather in June can be very hot.)

HOTELS – OFF CAMPUS

The following Hotels have provided special rates during MTI. **You must mention the Red Cross when making your reservation directly with your choice hotel by May 5th to get special rates.**

Midway Hotel (1-616-942-2550) at 4101 28th St. SE. Rate \$59 per night plus 7% lodging tax. Airport shuttle, transport to Calvin, and onsite restaurant.

Prince Center (1-616-526-7200 or 1-866-526-7200) on Calvin College's campus at 1800 East Beltline. Rate \$69 per night plus 7% lodging tax. Limited rooms are available.

Holiday Inn Select (1-616-285-7600) at 3063 Lake Eastbrook Blvd. SE Rate \$75 per night plus 7% lodging tax. Airport shuttle, transport to Calvin, and onsite restaurant.

Staybridge Suites (1-616-464-3200 at 3000 Lake Eastbrook Blvd. SE is adjacent to Holiday Inn Select. Rate \$65 for studio; \$79 for 1 bedroom suite and \$119 for 2 bedroom suite per night plus 7% lodging tax.

MEALS

The cost of lunch and snacks is included in the daily fee. Lunch is cafeteria style and there is a choice of two entrees. Soup and salad bar is also available.

Breakfast and dinner are on your own. Johnny's Snack Bar in the lower level of the Commons building (below the dining hall) opens at 7:00am. There are numerous good restaurants nearby on 28th Street. A list of available restaurants will be available at the registration desk.

Masters of Disaster: Grant Funding Needed to Spread the News!

The October 2005 issue of *Crosslinks* introduced an exciting new program entitled Masters of Disaster (MOD). MOD teaches students in grades K-12 the basic workings of floods, hurricanes, lightning, earthquakes, and tornadoes, along with general disaster preparedness and safety issues associated with these natural phenomena. The program has been a hit with local elementary and middle school teachers but the \$60 cost for each MOD kit is preventing many schools that would like to implement MOD from doing so. Tight school budgets simply have no room for even the bargain price of a MOD kit.

As education implementation coordinator for the Chapter, I have heard many teachers, PTO/PTA members, and principals say that they are ecstatic that the American Red Cross offers such a comprehensive, off-the-shelf program that has long been absent in our public and private schools. But, their school simply cannot afford the kit.

Substantial funding from American Red Cross and the Allstate Foundation keeps the kit price low, but an additional grant to cover the remaining \$60 per kit price would allow many more students access to this vital information.

MOD kits add potentially life-saving disaster safety information to any classroom, youth group, or after-school program in a fun and easy way for both the instructors and the students. Kits are tailored to one of three grade ranges: K-2, 3-5, and 6-8; and are designed to be integrated, not added, into an existing classroom curriculum.

MOD also is a great way for elementary and middle school teachers to integrate National Education Standards for mathematics, science, language arts, social studies, and the fine arts. One kit can be used for multiple classrooms. For example, the material in one MOD kit for grades 3-5 can be copied and used in every 3rd through 5th grade classroom of a particular school.

Each MOD kit includes ready-to-go lesson plans, activity sheets, age-related video, stickers and certificates, MOD trivia poster, and National Standards Chart.

Spring Cleaning? Sell Your Stuff on eBay and Help Red Cross!

You can sell unwanted "stuff" and help raise funds for the Chapter by donating items to **iSOLD It**, an eBay auctioneer, right here in Kalamazoo.

Here is how it works:

Donate any item that has an expected value of \$50 or more, weighs less than 150 pounds and measures less than 130 inches in length and girth to **iSOLD It**. Specify the American Red Cross of Kalamazoo as the beneficiary of the auction and **iSOLD It** will handle the rest. They will do the photography, list the item on eBay, conduct the auction, collect payment from the winning bidder and ship out the item once the auction closes.

After the item sells, **iSOLD It** will mail The American Red Cross a check for 70-80% of the final sale value. You can claim a deduction from your taxes (consult your tax advisor).

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Disaster Action Team (DAT)

Orientation- Outlines the expectations of a DAT member.

Disaster Assessment- Teaches participants Red Cross guidelines for assessing damages to homes and property.

ERV Training- Prepares volunteers to drive and maintain the Chapter's Emergency Response Vehicle.

Family Services- Introduces participants to the Family Services function. Participants learn the skills needed to conduct an effective client interview and use necessary documentation to provide assistance to disaster clients.

Introduction to Disaster- This video-based course provides the fundamental information about disaster, the community response, and the role of the Red Cross. *This course is a prerequisite to all other disaster training.*

Mass Care Overview- Basic information about the mass care function, which provides food and shelter to large numbers of people during disaster operations.

Orientation to Red Cross- Provides a general overview of basic Red Cross services.

Shelter Operations & Simulation- Prepares participants to effectively manage a mass care shelter and provides participants an opportunity to practice the knowledge and skills needed to operate a shelter.

Due to the Michigan Training Institute (MTI) set for June 6 - 11 in Grand Rapids, there will be no Disaster Training Classes held at the Greater Kalamazoo Area Chapter in June or July.

DSHR Members Without National Background Checks by February 28 Became Inactive

To ensure the safety and security of Red Cross volunteers, employees and clients, to protect Red Cross assets and reduce risk for all persons involved in Red Cross disaster relief operations, a mandatory national background check has been implemented for all all Disaster Services Human Resources (DSHR) members. Any DSHR member who did not complete the background check by February 28, 2006, had their DSHR records marked "temporary inactive." Those persons are not eligible for a disaster assignment or deployment until their national background check has been completed.

Below are some of the frequently asked questions (and answers) about the national background check program. For more info, call us at (269) 353-6180. The internet-based background check can be done at the Chapter or on your home computer if you have internet access (high-speed connection recommended).

Q. What is included in the standard DSHR background check?

A. A Social Security number verification along with a review of convictions from the national criminal file. The national criminal file includes sex offender registries from most states, prison parole and release files, state criminal record repositories, the Federal fugitive file and other proprietary information.

Q. How far in the past is the background check review?

A. Typically, 7 years. Because the search is national in scope, convictions in any state, regardless of current residence, could be reported.

Q. Does the individual DSHR candidate/member pay for the background check?

A. No. National headquarters funds DSHR background checks.

Q. What happens if a DSHR member refuses to go to the web-enabled portal and initiate a background check, to provide consent and release to authorize a background check?

A If a current DSHR member failed to initiate this process so a background check is completed by February 28, 2006, s/he was placed into inactive status. If no background check is completed by June 1, 2006, that DSHR member's records will be archived.

CSTalk by Doug Thompson, Director of *Community Services & Training*

This is the first *Crosslinks* since ongoing reorganization at our Chapter created the **Community Services and Training (CS&T)** department. CS&T is a consolidation of Emergency Services & Training, Health & Safety, internal training, Disaster planning and response, military services and international services including tracings. The new structure is designed to better coordinate all these services and to reduce costs while maintaining or increasing our service delivery.

If you like the catchy new title, “CSTalk”, I’ll take the credit. If you don’t, blame Terri Franklin, who actually came up with it.

We face ongoing and new challenges:

- Significant new standards in our CPR training programs will require retraining of all our Instructor/Trainers and Instructors this calendar year, as well as acquiring new course materials and training tools for all courses.
- Reaching the most at-risk populations, often the most challenging to access, with high-quality, timely and useful Health, Safety and Emergency Preparedness information.
- Providing additional training and deployment of the many new, as well as long-term, disaster volunteers, and finding new ways to engage these eager volunteers.
- Our continued involvement with other disaster, emergency response, health and homeland security organizations and the movement towards regionalization of those responses. The fact that we are already providing services in a four-county delivery area stands us in good stead, but many of these regional groups include areas in our partner Chapters, requiring that we all are “on the same page.”
- Our continued desire to play our part in state and Service Area activities. As a Chapter with a long history of such willingness and, in my opinion, ability; I feel it’s an obligation.
- Focusing our limited resources on those activities which best accomplish the strategic missions of the American Red Cross.

A modified committee structure accompanies this change. The *Service Delivery Committee (SDC)*, lead by Board member **Bill Kowalski**, is meeting regularly. Other committees represented on the *SDC* are; Health & Safety, chaired by **Brian Scribner**; International Services, chaired by **Sheri Ritchie**; Training by **Huan Le**; our Diversity Champion, **Ollie Barnes**; Military (AFES) services, **Bob Capp**; the Chair of volunteers, **Margo Rinehart**; as well as Board members **Laura Lentenbrink, Randy Miller, John Gore, Scott Koenigfeld and Rick VanEnk**.

Also on this committee is **Bob Johnson**. I list Bob last because I want to focus special thanks to him. For the last 15 or so years Bob and I have worked together as colleagues and friends. As chair of Disaster Services, we “argue” constantly as to “who works for whom”. The way we currently describe it is, “Doug works for Bob but Doug tells Bob what to do.” Every day I am further amazed by his knowledge, insight, energy and patience. Bob’s work has contributed greatly to our success and positive reputation, both locally and nationally.

I would also like to recognize several paid staff for their hard work and commitment. Everyone in the consolidated department has maintained focus on our customers and mission. **Paul Bostic, Tim Bougie, Kay Ensfield, Vaneitta Goines, Erin Lucarotti, Anne Howley-O’Brien, Russ Papworth, and Claire Torp** are all to be applauded.

You may have noticed **Cathleen Haight** not listed in that group above. That’s because I want to specially welcome her to our organization, in the newly created position of administrative support for the CS&T Department. Any of you who’ve watched the “gears” Cathleen needs to change during each and every day probably marvel, as I do, the ease with which she’s learned, adapted and contributed. Welcome, **Cathleen**.

**First Aid and CPR Guidelines 2005
Change Highlights for Lay Responders**

The 2005 American Heart Association Guidelines for Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation and Emergency Cardiovascular Care and the 2005 American Red Cross/American Heart Association Guidelines for First Aid have brought about a number of changes that will impact Red Cross training programs. The chart below provides a highlight and overview of some of those changes for the lay responder courses. The chart does not cover all of the changes, but is intended to provide a brief look at some of the important changes coming to Red Cross courses.

These changes will be reflected in the revised materials to be released beginning spring of 2006. Red Cross instructors should not teach or adapt the current materials to reflect the new skills and guidelines.

MEASLES INITIATIVE



Despite the availability of a safe, effective and inexpensive vaccine for more than 40 years, measles remains a leading vaccine-preventable cause of childhood deaths.

THE WORLD'S PROBLEM:

- Millions of children still remain at risk from measles. Malnourished and un-immunized children under five, especially infants, are at high risk of contracting measles and are more vulnerable to death.
- Measles is the leading cause of vaccine-preventable death among children.
- Some 470,000 children die of measles each year.
- Measles can cause severe health complications, including pneumonia, diarrhea, encephalitis, and corneal scarring, which can lead to blindness.
- Spreading through the air, measles is one of the most contagious diseases known.
- The primary reason for continuing high childhood deaths is the failure to deliver at least one dose of measles vaccine to all infants. *It costs less than \$1 to vaccinate a child against measles.*
- In developing countries, measles death rates range from 1-5%, but in refugee settings and among malnourished children, the death rate may reach 10-30%.

PROGRESS SO FAR:

- As of 2005, the **Measles Initiative** has supported more than 40 African countries to vaccinate 200 million children, saving 1.2 million lives.
- Since 1999, measles cases and deaths in Africa have dropped by 60%, largely due to the support provided by the **Measles Initiative** to the affected countries.
- The **Initiative's** method has been so successful in reaching 90% of at-risk children with the measles vaccine in Africa, that other health interventions such as malaria prevention, vitamin A, de-worming medicine and other interventions are being integrated into measles campaigns.
- *The Initiative is ahead of schedule, under budget and exceeding its targets.*
- To prevent measles outbreaks after the December 2004 tsunami, the **Measles Initiative** supported affected countries to carry out emergency vaccinations and is currently involved in rebuilding long-term immunization programs.

A HEALTHIER FUTURE:

- Because of the **Measles Initiative's** success in Africa, the program has expanded into Asia, where the measles burden remains high.
- The **Measles Initiative's** goal is to reduce measles deaths by 90% by 2010.
- Measles vaccination is one of the most cost-effective public health interventions available for preventing deaths.
- Immunization reaches more children than any other intervention and is often the only basic healthcare service that children receive in their first year of life. Vaccinations are essential for child survival.
- There are more than 25 measles vaccination campaigns scheduled for 2006. Of these, approximately 10 will include the distribution of insecticide-treated nets to help prevent malaria.

BACKGROUND:

Launched in February 2001, the **Measles Initiative** (www.measlesinitiative.org) is a long-term commitment to reduce and control measles deaths globally. The **Initiative** is led by the United Nations Foundation, American Red Cross, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF and the World Health Organization.

Other key players in the fight against measles includes the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), Becton, Dickinson and Company, Vodafone Group Foundation, The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the Church of Jesus Christ and Latter Day Saints, the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization (GAVI) and countries and governments affected by measles.

The American Red Cross is a leading participant in the Measles Initiative. If you are interested in this, or other aspects of the ARC's international work, the Chapter's International Services Committee invites you! The Committee meets monthly.
